Scripture Lesson: Genesis 32:22-31

The same night (Jacob) got up and took his two wives, his two maids, and his eleven children, and crossed the ford of the Jabbok. 23 He took them and sent them across the stream, and likewise everything that he had. 24 Jacob was left alone; and a man wrestled with him until daybreak. 25 When the man saw that he did not prevail against Jacob, he struck him on the hip socket; and Jacob's hip was put out of joint as he wrestled with him. 26 Then he said, "Let me go, for the day is breaking." But Jacob said, "I will not let you go, unless you bless me."

27 So he said to him, "What is your name?" And he said, "Jacob." 28 Then the man said, "You shall no longer be called Jacob, but Israel, for you have striven with God and with humans, and have prevailed." 29 Then Jacob asked him, "Please tell me your name." But he said, "Why is it that you ask my name?" And there he blessed him.
30 So Jacob called the place Peniel, saying, "For I have seen God face to face, and yet my life is preserved."
31 The sun rose upon him as he passed Penuel, limping because of his hip.

Scripture Lesson: Matthew 14:13-21 (A Women's Lectionary for the Whole Church – Wilda C. Gafney)

Now when Jesus heard (about the death of John the Baptizer), he withdrew from there in a boat to a deserted place by himself. And when the crowds heard, they followed him on foot from the towns. 14 When he arrived, he saw a great crowd, and he had compassion for them, and healed their sick. 15 Now by evening, the disciples came to him and said, "The place is deserted, and the time has gone; send the crowds away so that they can go into the villages and buy themselves food." 16 Instead, Jesus said to them, "They do not need to leave; you all give them something to eat." 17 They replied to him, "We do not have anything here but five loaves and two fish." 18 Then Jesus said, "Bring them here to me." 19 And he ordered the crowds to sit down on the grass; he took the five loaves and the two fish, looked towards heaven, and blessed and broke them. He gave (them) to the disciples, and the disciples gave them to the crowds. 20 And all ate and were filled; and they took up the abundance of fragments, twelve baskets full. 21 Now those who ate were women and children, besides about five thousand men.

Meditation: "Blessed Beyond Belief"

One: The fortitude of the Holy be with you.

He was killed for challenging power and privilege. His mother wept. And, like us, Jesus was blessed. Cherished by his family. Anointed with oil by his beloved, Mary. Surrounded by friends and followers. He learned and taught. He received hospitality, sat with children, and took time to be alone.

And so, empowered by Jesus whose love mirrored yours

in both brokenness and blessing, we join together with your people on earth, with all Creation, and with the full company of heaven, praising your name and joining the unending hymn:

Holy, holy (One); God of power and might. Heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest! (3x)

One: Blessed, O God, is your Christ, Jesus, in whom we saw a life lived in all its potential – broken, yet forever blessed, like Jacob wrestling with the angel. We saw a life lived in all its sacred power. Life shared and abundant. Love creative and fervent for justice. We saw, too, the consequences of living as if the kindom were indeed close at hand. Living as if there were indeed enough to go around, for everyone to be fed and filled.

On the night ... And so as we break the bread and share the cup, we remember. We remember love broken and love poured out. As those held in and bound together by that same love, we taste the same Spirit and feast on the same promise, as we proclaim the mystery at the heart of our faith:

One: Pour out your Spirit on all of us gathered here, in person and virtually. Pour out your Spirit on this bread and this cup, O God, and on all the elements we use to join with you in this holy meal. Nourished in body and in spirit, may we become your body in the world. May your love flow in and through us toward the blessing that is enough for all, toward life made whole for all.
